

In response to interest from parishioners attending the recent Annual Parish Meeting, Camerton Parish Council is looking to organise a community litter pick sometime on a weekend during the summer.

If you would be interested in helping please could you send your details to Kathryn Manchee, Camerton Parish Clerk, via the usual contact methods (tel. 01761 411305, Monday to Friday 9 am to 5 pm, or email camertonparishclerk@hotmail.co.uk). We would also like suggestions on particular spots in the parish that you feel need some special attention. Note we can only pick litter in areas with a 30mph limit or less, where there is a pavement or footway.

All volunteers would have to do is turn up on the day. The parish council will carry out the work and communication with BANES Council on borrowing equipment such as high visibility vests and litter pickers, undertaking a risk assessment and other health and safety requirements.

Camerton Batch Local Nature Re

As I reported in the Spring edition of the Camerton Parish News the Batch has been closed to the General Public for safety reasons. It remains closed whilst negotiations with forestry contractors regarding the East face clearing and replanting and the renewal of all the steps are still under discussion, the main reason for the delay being the availability of the contractor.

We are hoping this will be in the next few months with the emphasis being on the repair and fitting of new steps. The plan is to refit all the steps, which will be dug out to facilitate an even spacing of steps for ease of use and at a more regular depth and width. Hand rails will be fitted on both sides of the steeper section, with the steps fitted with a section of chicken wire to prevent slipping when being used. Once the steps are complete the Batch will be reopened to the public.

The East and North East slopes work will be undertaken in the late summer/autumn. This will involve clearance of any brash that has been left on the slopes by dragging down and chipping. Any suitable lengths of timber that have been left on the bank will be stored safely at the bottom of the bank. This period of work will be undertaken prior to any replanting. We have in excess of 500 whips of various broadleaf trees to be planted in the Autumn period which will all be staked and tubed to protect them from animal grazing.

The timber removed last year has still not been sold. We have had interest from three companies but to date no sale, the one problem being the access to the stored timber. This needs to be moved nearer to the field gate, in order to facilitate easier loading onto the timber lorries.

There is also a need to repair the Red Hill entrance information centre and notice boards, which have been damaged by vandalism. All other information boards throughout the Batch have been removed for safe keeping.

From a pure nature perspective, the Batch is thriving; the bird population appears to be increasing, especially the crows, with the small mammals and deer enjoying the woodland environment. Maybe the rest from us humans is helping!

Neighbourhood Watch

Hello everybody, welcome to Summer; by the time you receive this Newsletter Spring will just be a memory - cold, damp and wet and windy, and even snow earlier. Nothing we can do about the weather but at least it gives us something to talk about.

Something else to talk about - Avon and Somerset Police have recently reported an increase in Rural Crime. Only to be expected really with the reduction in police numbers and large areas to cover in Rural Communities. This situation of course should put us on our guard and remind us that we should be more aware of what is going on in our communities, report anything that appears suspicious, and also take extra care to look after our possessions.

Nottingham Knockers are on the prowl again, this time at Lansdown in Bath. You may remember I reported on activity in the Spring Newsletter. Nottingham Knockers are cold callers on residents trying to sell various items in order to set them back on the right track. The goods they are trying to sell are over priced products and of inferior quality; when refused, they become aggressive and try to force the sale.

Bath, numerous items stolen from a property, cameras and equipment, lenses, telescopes and tripod.

Farrington Gurney, theft from a vehicle, tools taken.

Unfortunately closer to our patch, Timsbury – four unknown men forced entry into McColls, cash stolen from Cash Machine. –

High Littleton High Street, glass smashed in garage door in an attempt to gain entry. Not satisfied with that another garage rear window smashed, again in the High Street.

It has been fairly quiet here on our patch although there are those annoying phone calls. I have had a few in the last month to tell me that



my internet link would be turned off within 48 hours if I didn't respond to details about my email address and particulars about my internet provider. The caller claimed to be from BT at, so say, main office in London. BT have since confirmed that they have no main office in London and certainly would not cold call on any subject; all their contact with customers would be by letter.

If you see anything that concerns you please call a neighbour or contact your local Neighbourhood Watch. You can also contact Crime Stoppers on 0800 555 111 or the police on 101; if it's serious, dial 999.

Enjoy your Summer - at least we have had a preview during May Bank Holiday, let's hope we can expect more. Take care and stay safe.

There have been an interesting variety of calls to the Police for the Camerton area. Since January we have received calls concerning a dead badger and loose horses on the road. A road rage incident and an obstruction by a broken down lorry were also reported. Sadly the inevitable road traffic collisions (RTC's) on Skinners Hill featured twice amongst numerous other reported incidents.

Camerton & Peasedown Croquet Club

Camerton & Peasedown Croquet Club Enters the Fray

Camerton & Peasedown Croquet Club's (CPCC) new season exploded with Croquet Association (CA) Tournaments and Competitions leaving some of its key players shellshocked after daily calls to duty on home and foreign lawns.

One Ball - a new format of croquet devised by the CA amalgamating Association and Golf Croquet - drew players from across the South West. The three leading players, one being CPCC's Patrick Knight, will go on to play in the National Final in Surbiton.

A three day Short Croquet Competition similarly attracted many four-member teams from the region and beyond. This form of association croquet is played on half lawns and reduced so a game usually takes under an hour. The competition was eventually won by a team from Nailsea.

CPCC also held the first of the CA's 25 Golf Croquet B Level-Play Tournaments. It was won by CPCC's scratch entry, Marion Button. Two years ago she was playing in the high handicap league. After losing only one game in the morning to a more experienced player she raised her game to beat all her afternoon's opponents, leading one to histrionics. She now goes forward to the final in October, to be played on CPCC's home lawns.

The club's challenge for the CA's Murphy Interclub Shield started with a match against Enfield. It was close fought, CPCC eventually winning 5:2. They now meet Watford.

The undercurrent of League matches began on a rain-drenched day against Taunton Deane in the Central South League. Reflecting the weather, it ended in defeat. The second, in the Central North League, was more successful. The sun was shining for once, and CPCC beat Nailsea 13:7 even though the visitors drew on their National Junior Champion, James Galpin.

Back home, the new recruits to the ranks were faring well on the club's Beginners' Course.

And the season has hardly begun.
