# Parish Council News

### **Dear Parishioners**

I hope you all had a good Christmas and now we are looking forward to the spring and the warmer weather.
Unfortunately we had too many grey wet days this winter. This has led to some water drainage issues on the roads but these have been cleared quite quickly once reported to BANES highways.

Next month, on Thursday April 19<sup>th</sup>, the Parish Council will be hosting the Annual Parish Meeting at Camerton Community Hall starting at 7.30 pm. I will be reviewing the events of the last twelve months and the Clerk will be reporting on the Parish Council finances for the financial year 2017/18. Our guest speaker this year is a representative of the charity Water Survival Box who will be talking about their work on providing a rapid response in situations that result in families having no access to safe drinking water, having also lost their homes and possessions. We hope to see many of you there. You will all have noticed the closure of the Batch



at the end of December 2017 due to health and safety issues. The Batch is currently facing an uncertain future in terms of finance and volunteer resource. Therefore at the meeting we will also be explaining how both the Parish Council and you can help us to get this wonderful community facility back up and running as soon as possible.

Concerns about speeding throughout the parish continue to be a problem. As you can see from the police article later in this newsletter this can have awful consequences. Therefore we would urge all residents to drive safely on our roads. For our part the Parish Council will continue to work on trying to address this issue by working closely with BANES council and the police.

I also want to take this opportunity to thank everyone who has made a contribution to the success of the community hall. Only a year ago the hall was on the ropes and facing closure. Now, a year on, bookings are up, finances are on a better footing and much refurbishment has been undertaken. There have also been several community events and talks to help with the ongoing need to raise

funds to complete the programme of essential refurbishment. It's just a shame that the Parish Council cannot use the hall for our meetings. Not only are there very few slots available (thanks to the great success of the new committee) but we are, by law, not allowed to hold our parish council meetings in premises that are licensed for the supply of alcohol. That said, you are all very welcome to attend any of our Parish Council meetings.

Hope to see lots of you at the Annual Parish Meeting. Also don't forget we would also love to see you at future council meetings.



# Camerton Community Hall

The new committee of the Camerton Community Hall has been reviewing the past year, a year of surprises, many achievements and a few disappointments.

Almost from the first week there was a big setback in store with the realisation that most of the electrics were in need of upgrading. Then came the discovery that there was a considerable amount of water being wasted owing to a number of leaks/overflows in the toilets.

However, on a more positive note it can be reported the dressing rooms (which had been redundant for several years) have now been completely renovated with all new lighting and showers. Also all toilets at

the hall have been replaced and the new electrics are nearly finished with new lighting in the hall, kitchen, bar and toilets.

In accordance with our new Habitat Management Plan (HMP), the small wooded area (Spinney) phase one has now been completed and we will be looking to complete phase two (path and learning area construction) by the middle of March 2018, when we will then be undertaking phase three (indigenous planting and bird/ bat box installation). It is hoped to have this Natural Habitat facility open fully to the public by the time we hold our now annual Summer Fete later this year. Once up and running we will continue to manage this facility and ensure it not only provides added

natural habitat for flora and fauna, but is also enjoyed by the community as a whole, be it recreational or educational.

As part of the HMP we will be offering people the opportunity to have a living memorial to a loved one under our **Memory Tree Scheme**. This will enable members of the community to sponsor a tree in what is undoubtedly a beautiful location and in doing so support the natural habitat and of course the hall; more details to follow soon. We have also installed numerous external lights for safety and security purposes along with CCTV. The latter not only provides added security but should deter any further unsocial

activity, which unfortunately had been happening some nights, particularly in what *was* the dark area at the bottom of the car park.

As many of you know, over the years the field has been used for a whole range of activities, many of which required access to proper and safe electric supply. We are pleased to announce that such a supply has recently been installed by way of several external hook-ups. By doing this we hope to maximise the use of the field whilst ensuring the growing demand for outdoor electric supply is provided in accordance with the latest relevant safety regulations.

A full list of all the refurbishment works undertaken will soon be posted on our website in time for the AGM; I have no doubt you will pleased with what has been achieved

in such a relatively short time. As you can see there has been a great deal of hard work put in by the whole committee, who have raised much needed revenue to pay for all the work that's being done at the hall through the Easter Fun Day, Summer Fete, Winter talks and Halloween Party, with many more different events to come during 2018.

The biggest income stream for the hall is the bookings. We have to thank our regular weekly hirers for their support (with more enquiries received every week) and the casual bookings are also well up, thanks mainly to the hall's new web site <a href="https://www.camertoncommunityhall.co.uk">www.camertoncommunityhall.co.uk</a>; people particularly like the location for weddings.

We currently have football back on Saturday afternoons and Sunday mornings; hopefully it will continue on into the future, and we are proud to boast the best dressing rooms in any parish for miles around!

A key objective now is to push on with events, and we are very pleased to announce a first for the parish: the acclaimed **Mendip Male Voice Choir** will be performing their new 2018 programme at the hall on **MARCH 26**<sup>TH</sup> **AT 7.30PM**. (Bar from 7pm)

# Camerton Batch Local Nature Re

This report is one that I hoped I would never have to write, but unfortunately, I must report that the Batch is currently closed to the public on safety grounds. We have had to make that decision as all the steps and footpaths are now in such a poor state of repair and therefore are too dangerous for public use. Both main entrances have been closed and secured by chain and padlocks so please bear with us until such time that we can undertake the necessary repairs.

We hoped that we could just restrict the use to the central section with the eastern steps being closed as a result of the damage caused by the forestry management work undertaken last year. But whilst this was suitable for the Summer period, the Autumn and Winter periods have not been kind to us, with extensive damage to the remaining three sets of steps. This has been exacerbated by the reduction of members in the Batch Support Committee and hence a reduction in the maintenance role that the team can undertake. There are only four members remaining, so if there is

anyone who would like to join the committee you would be more than welcome.

We engaged a firm of woodland consultants to view the site and recommend the necessary remedial action. We now have their report and an estimate of the cost of replacing all the current sets of steps, work necessary to clear the Batch of fallen trees and debris plus the replanting of the Eastern end and part of the Northern faces. The associated costs for this work are in excess of £7.000. which is well above the Support Group's current reserves, and we have had to seek help from the Parish Council in this respect. The Parish Council Chairman has made reference to this in his report in this issue of the magazine. I will also provide a report on this situation at the Annual Parish Meeting.

We are still having negotiations with the company who wants the timber that was felled as part of the Phase 2 development work undertaken last spring. All the felled timber has now been cut to their required length of 2.4 metres. Unfortunately, the timber

stacks need to be moved nearer to the fence and gate of the field in order for the transport to be able to lift and stack the sawn timber for transportation. Hence, we are looking for help to move the timber, so if you can help in that respect please contact me. This is now an urgent requirement as the sale of the timber will help fund the Batch steps build.

It is evident from this report that we are under-resourced in terms of committee members, volunteers and funds. The sole method of funding is via the Batch lottery; however the numbers contributing have fallen quite rapidly and we now only make a small profit. So once again, if you can help by joining the lottery please do so as it's our only funding activity. If you want to join, please contact Louise Fry on 01761 471280.

As you can see we have a problem but are currently looking at all ways to raise extra funds. Increased numbers in the lottery is not the only approach. We are also looking at local grant aid provision and other nature organisation funding such as the Woodland Trust. In the last report I

stated that we may start a sponsorship scheme for steps and replanting. This is still under consideration.

I apologise for having to provide a rather gloomy picture, but I am sure with our resolve and help from you we can overcome this tough time and provide a safe Batch for all to enjoy.



Rogue Traders often referred to as **Nottingham Knockers operating** throughout the BANES Council area -Combe Down, Farrington Gurney and High Littleton especially. Unknown males trying to sell garden furniture; these cold callers become verbally aggressive when residents refuse to buy any of their goods, which usually are of inferior quality. Nottingham Knockers are cold callers telling residents that they are previous offenders trying to go straight who then try and sell you poor quality over-priced goods.

Telephone scam - a man, claiming to be a police officer – DS Jason Colby of Putney Police Station, telephoning elderly residents in the Bristol area saying that two suspects have been found in possession of cloned bank cards for an account belonging to the resident. He then wishes to confirm card number and PIN. Police officers and banks will never ask for such details. If you think you have been defrauded you can ring the Fraud Action Line (0300 1232040).

A 'micro-chipped' 2 year old female springer spaniel taken from her kennel in Shoscombe. Police are asking for any information to find her and reunite with her owner.

If you are concerned or see anything suspicious please call a neighbour, your local Neighbourhood Watch contact, or Crime Stoppers on 0800 555 111/the Police on 101; if its serious dial 999.



# **Avon and Somerset Police Information**

Recently I was asked by the Parish Clerk to conduct some research into the factors causing the road closures in the Camerton area. In particular this was after the latest serious incident on 5 December 2017.

It was frightening to read that in 2017 there were 8 reported incidents on Camerton/Skinners Hill alone. Sadly some of these incidents were life threatening or resulted in life changing injuries for the people involved. I know that residents are well used to making



detours around the inevitable road closures and disruption that these road traffic collisions (RTC's) bring. Please allow me at this point to thank you all for your patience and understanding at these times.

Whilst it is hard to pin down one factor likely to cause accidents on our car journeys, it is fair to say that inappropriate speed is mostly always a factor. Slow down, look at the road and weather conditions and adjust your speed accordingly. Drivers being distracted by outside factors also feature highly; leave your phone alone – it is not worth taking the risk. Lastly it is the 'risk takers' who endanger all of us; that devil-may-care attitude that is so repugnant in drivers and can often have far-reaching and tragic consequences.

I know that the local council are looking into the infrastructure of our road system and hopefully this will mean improved changes for all of our safety in the future. In the meantime please take heed of the above and drive carefully.

Also affecting the local community is the sudden rise in vehicle crime recently. From 1 November 2017 to 15 January 2018 there were 28 reported incidents of theft from

motor vehicles (TFMV). Mostly it appeared as though tools were being targeted but many other items of value were also reported as stolen. Paulton took most of the brunt of this spike but I also know that some residents of Camerton were victims.

However there may be good news to report. At the beginning of January a vehicle containing many tools identified as being stolen overnight from the North Somerset area was located. The 2 occupants were later identified as being involved in criminality. Police investigating the series of thefts from the Paulton area are trying to ascertain if the 2

suspects could be responsible for the van break-ins locally. It has been noted that since the identification of the occupants' vehicle, crime in the Paulton area has decreased.

PS I also want to thank the local resident who kindly brought me a flask of tea and homemade cake whilst I was stationed for many hours on a freezing cold day at a road closure at one of the above RTC's. A small gesture from her that meant so much to me.

# Radstock Museum

PLUNGE DEEP DOWN INTO THE RADSTOCK COALMINES WITH MUSEUM'S NEW VIRTUAL REALITY EXPERIENCE

Have you ever wondered what it might have been like deep underground in the coalmines of Somerset? A new Virtual Reality (VR) attraction at Somerset Coalfield Life at Radstock Museum will take you on a ride down into the mines of Radstock and on a journey back in time through the mine tunnels in a brand new, unique and exciting experience.

Take your seat for the fully 3-dimensional trip, pop on the lightweight headset, which fits comfortably over glasses; you will find yourself in the cage (the lift) which took the miners down underground and then your descent begins......!

You are now in the role of a miner clunking and bumping down the mineshaft in the cage dropping at a rate of 60 feet per second, taking you deep underground. Once down at the pit bottom, you find yourself travelling in a coal truck along rails on the underground roadway. Turn your head to look all around you and see the pit pony stables and miners eating their meagre lunches.



Pass by miners cutting away at the coalface with picks and make way for a pit pony as it comes towards you pulling its load of coal to the bottom of the shaft.

A sudden rock fall in one of the coal seams off the roadway sends miners shouting and trying to escape with their lives, while in another seam a group of miners has accidentally blasted through into an old, disused flooded mine tunnel and water rushes in, leaving miners once again racing to escape.

The VR ride is the ambitious work of two students: Georgina Hill and Barry Lewis from Bath College, Somer Valley Campus in collaboration with Radstock Museum. Georgina and Barry have developed and implemented the ride for the final project of their

course, gaining them both a
Foundation Degree in Applied
Computing. The final project
required the students to draw on
all the computing skills they had
acquired during the course as well
as to demonstrate skills in areas
such as project management and
collaborating with a third party and
client.

Barry and Georgina discovered that they work so well as a team that they are already planning a new and improved 2<sup>nd</sup> generation of the ride where *you* the rider will be able to interact further by picking up implements and using them plus more!
