

#### **Road Safety**

I want to address the recent concerns regarding speeding within our parish. We understand the frustration and worry this issue causes. The Parish Council has been actively working with the local police and Bath & North East Somerset Council to address these concerns.

It's important to note that while the Vehicle Activated Sign (VAS) on Camerton Hill has been repaired and reinstalled, it seems that many vehicles are still triggering the device as they pass through the village. This issue highlights the need for a more comprehensive approach to road safety.

#### Camerton Batch Local Nature Reserve

The parish council recently met with the Avon Wildlife Trust to discuss how The Batch could contribute to their Pollinator Pathways project. This exciting initiative aims to create a network of wildflower-rich habitats across the region, supporting declining pollinator species such as bees and butterflies. The parish council is excited to explore ways to enhance the Batch's biodiversity and contribute to this important project. We will share more details as they become available.

The parish council has also discussed the repair of the damaged fence near the Red Hill entrance, and plan to start the work here soon. This will not only enhance the site's appearance but also improve its safety along the adjacent footpath at the

bottom of Red Hill.



#### Ward Councillors Report

#### Camerton Community SpeedWatch News from Ward Cllrs Fiona Gourley and Matt McCabe

After nearly 5 years in the role, Anita Cockwell is stepping down as our Community SpeedWatch Coordinator.

Matt and Fiona met with Anita to hear about the role she has played in keeping the village safe since 2020 and to thank her for her service. Anita regularly volunteers with other residents to measure drivers' speed at weekly sessions.

Alongside other road safety measures, the volunteers are a visible reminder in various locations to drive safely, strengthened by the frequent presence of the Police Road Safety Enforcement Officer. Shockingly, 12.6% of drivers do speed through the village, with top speeds between 30 and 50mph.

Over the past year, the Community SpeedWatch team has monitored over 4650 cars, with 585 over the speed limit. The data is passed back to the Police, who visit and charge excessive speeders and repeat offenders.



Anita is also Administrator and Joint Network Lead of the regional Community SpeedWatch Association, where she liaises with the Chief Inspector, the Police and Crime Commissioner, B&NES Council, and local Community Speed Watch volunteers.

Fiona and Matt said: "After 5 years of service, Anita will be stepping down from the Camerton SpeedWatch Team which will be a great loss to the community. We'd like to thank Anita for all she and the team have done to make Camerton just a little bit safer.

We are now calling on other residents to help out. If you feel you could get involved in this important work, please email Anita at

Camertoncommunityspeedwatch@gm ail.com. The team are looking for 3-5 more volunteers to help reduce speeding through Camerton. It is only an hour a week, when the weather's nice, with full training and instructions given by the Police. You do get to wear high-vis jackets and wield a speed gun!"

### Camerton Community SpeedWatch Group

It is with regret that I have to advise that the **Camerton Community SpeedWatch (CSW) Scheme** will cease to operate as of 1<sup>st</sup> January 2025.

Our small group of three volunteers has operated weekly roadside CSW sessions for several years but as one is now leaving the village it is no longer viable to operate the scheme with just two. Avon and Somerset Police policies state that roadside sessions can only operate with a minimum of two volunteers; however, this puts enormous pressure on the remaining two to operate the equipment and to record safely and accurately. In addition, this does not provide flexibility for holidays or sickness, so weeks can go by without us being visible out on the roadside. Despite advertising for additional volunteers, I have received no response, so I have no other option now than to cease operations.

Whilst the existing team stand down, the Camerton CSW Scheme can be resurrected at any time provided the Police receive enough successful applications from volunteers.

## Camerton & Peasedown Croquet Club

#### Seasonal round-up of news from Camerton and Peasedown Croquet Club.

As many readers will know, Camerton and Peasedown Croquet Club play all versions of the game of croquet on their four splendid, fullsize lawns, which overlook the Cam Valley.

In 2024 the Club held introductory 'taster' sessions in the spring and throughout the summer. Anyone can play a game of croquet, even after one session; all you need is a pair of flat shoes, as all the other equipment is included if you attend a beginners session.

In April the Club ran a light-hearted 'One-Ball' competition which raised £175 for the British Heart Foundation. This event is coordinated by Croquet England and favours a different charity each year.

Both experienced and relatively new Club members were included in the 7 teams that were entered into the South West Federation Leagues. This season saw success for the Short croquet team, who won Division 4 of the Federation's Autumn Short croquet tournament, and for the CPCC 'A' handicap team, who won their division for the first time.

A mix of Club singles and doubles tournaments, played at level play and to handicap, were organised through the summer. Finals day on October 14<sup>th</sup> was a wonderful celebration of the game and 7 trophies were awarded to the winners.

Individual success also came to CPCC players. The pairing of Andy Loakes and Colin Britt placed equal 3rd in the 2024 National Doubles Championship in July. The pair also represented Somerset when they won the Division 1 Inter-County Championship at Southwick in August. Later in August Colin was accepted into the prestigious Croquet England 'Eights' competition, where he won the plate.



On the social side the Club has enjoyed a summer barbeque with 'crazy croquet' challenges, regular Club lunches and Club Quiz Evenings.

Going into winter things change a bit. The lawns are re-configured to allow areas of hard wear to recover; but play goes on with regular Club roll-up sessions and internal tournaments. A FREE taster afternoon will be offered to all-comers on the first Sunday of each month; Jan 5<sup>th</sup>, Feb 2<sup>nd</sup> and March 2<sup>nd</sup>.

Croquet is a very accessible game. It can be played socially or competitively; it gets you out in the fresh air and mixing with other people; it's good for your health and wellbeing. The game uses a combination of skill and tactics (as well as a degree of luck!) and age is no barrier; women and men play on equal terms. Come along and see what all the fun is about; you will be made most welcome.

#### Police News

Following a national trend, BANES has seen an increase in knife crime involving young people. Due to the lasting trauma suffered by those involved in or witnessing such events, the Early Interventions

Team (part of the Neighbourhood Policing Team), has been looking at how it can provide support, safeguarding, signposting and relevant referrals at the earliest opportunity.

Following a lot of research and preparation, the Teachable Moments Engagement Car (TMEC) was introduced.

The TMEC pilot started on 26<sup>th</sup> July, and allows Police Officers to work in partnership with dedicated Outreach Workers from Youth Connect South West (YCSW). Officers work in plain clothes and individuals are not forced to engage.

Sergeant Heather Anderton completed a TMEC shift on Friday 16<sup>th</sup> August alongside a Senior Outreach Worker, Rob. First stop, Midsomer Norton Skate Park. Sergeant Anderton and Rob stayed chatting for around half an hour and it was enlightening. Not all of the group were happy to speak to Police, so they went off to another part of the park and that was fine. The few who stayed spoke freely about their experiences with the Police, how safe they do or don't feel in the area, their views on the lack of provision, but also just general chat and shared a few jokes. They were given some advice, and information on upcoming provision. It was a really good, positive engagement.

They then made their way to
Keynsham, where they had a walk
around the High Street and
Memorial Park. On the High Street,
they recognised a couple of
individuals who are open to the
Police due to concerns around the
risk of serious violence and
exploitation. While initially they
were not keen to speak to them,
curiosity got the better of them and
a full conversation followed.

Sergeant Anderton and Rob then continued with their engagement patrols around Southgate shopping centre in Bath, which was unusually quiet. There were small pockets of children and young people, some of whom were willing to chat to them. They headed off to some other locations around Bath before heading back for the end of their shift.

They were lucky on this shift. There were no serious violence incidents. The primary purpose of the TMEC is to attend in the aftermath of a serious violence incident, when the Police response is scaling down, to provide a 'teachable moment' where Police Officers and Outreach Workers can engage with young individuals who may benefit from additional support when they are likely to be most responsive to it. This in turn can address the gap in service provision around early identification and intervention for vulnerable young people who have not yet been identified by other agencies or services: a 'reachable moment'.

What did Sergeant Anderton get from this shift? She got the benefit of years of experience from Rob, whose primary role is talking to children and young people.
Engaging with them on their level.
Humanising Police Officers. Building trust and relationships. Offering advice and support. Maybe, just maybe, going some way towards preventing them from following the wrong path.

Will there be success from just one shift? No! However, this pilot scheme is running until March 25<sup>th</sup> 2025, every Friday between 1400 and 2200. Various locations and crime hotspots across BANES will be visited week on week and Officers from the Early Interventions Team, as well as Neighbourhood Beat Officers, will be working.

We will become familiar faces to those and other children. We will build relationships and improve their trust. We will offer them support, safeguarding, signposting and relevant referrals. We will identify risks at the earliest opportunity.

## Neighbourhood Watch

Gosh, another year coming to an end! Throughout the last 12 months, I'm glad to report that nothing too serious has occurred, crime-wise, on our patch. That doesn't mean that we can relax our guard: apart from casual opportunist criminals, the day of social media has enabled an increase in fraudulent methods of obtaining personal data and money. The contact by fraudsters is usually made via email or telephone text; a typical example is as described under the heading of SCAMS. We must all keep our wits about us.

#### **Vehicle Crime**

Someone stole sunglasses and cash from a car parked on Packhorse Lane in South Stoke. The owner of the car had forgotten to lock the vehicle, allowing easy access to an opportunist thief.

#### **Burglaries**

A home on Green Lane in Hinton Charterhouse was burgled while the occupants were away. The offender(s) forced the rear patio doors to enter the property; a large amount of antique jewellery was taken. CCTV witnessed two males break into a garage at Dunkerton. The offenders cut the bolts from the door to gain entry; tools and a skateboard were taken.

Thieves entered through the back gate to gain access to the rear garden of a home at Ashgrove in Peasedown St John. The offenders broke the padlock on the garden shed and stole a number of hand tools.

Again at Ashgrove in Peasedown St John, a garden shed in a rear garden was broken into and a bright yellow Majo Mountain bike was stolen.

There was an attempt to break into a property on High Street in High Littleton. The offenders used a wheelie bin to reach the first floor bathroom window, which was smashed; no entry to the property was made.

A male and female were caught on CCTV as they tried force entry to a home on The Street in Chew Stoke. The offenders used a crowbar in an attempt to force the front door, causing damage in the process.

#### Scams

Parking Penalty Charge – Avon and Somerset Police are warning that SCAMS in the form of a text are circulating. The text encourages recipients to click on a link to pay a fictitious parking fine. The link leads to a convincing looking fraudulent website which looks like the official government website. You will be asked to enter your email address, vehicle registration number and card details to make a payment, usually £20. If you receive a text message like this, don't click on the link as fraudsters can steal your personal and financial data to commit identity fraud and take your money away.

Finally – Exceeding the speed limit is also a criminal offence, especially if someone gets injured. The junction with Weekesley Lane at Meadgate, within the 20mph speed limit, is becoming quite notorious of late. There have been 3 vehicle collisions: 3pm on Sunday 3rd November, 7pm on Tuesday 12th November and 10am on Wednesday 13th November. Fortunately nobody was injured on these occasions, but one day ... perish the thought.

As always, if you are in any doubt or see anyone or anything suspicious, call a neighbour or local NHW contact. You could also call the police by dialling 101 (or 999 if it's serious) or you could even contact Crime Stoppers on 0800 555 111.

Stay safe, keep well and look after each other.
